Dear Judges:

You guys probably already know my name is Yusemi Mondragón; unlike many teenagers, however, I like to go by my last name. This school year has been a big awakening – in less than a year I began learning a new language, enlisted in the army, gained acceptance into UNG, and decided what I will be doing for the rest of my life. I am very excited to begin my life on my own, but at the same time I am terrified and scared of failing and disappointing my mother; as many of my close friends know, I will become the first person in my family to graduate high school and attend college. I am less than a few months away from accomplishing my lifelong dream – serving my country and learning Mandarin Chinese – but at the same time I cannot help but wish I had more time. I am confident that one year from the date I ship to basic training I will be promoted from private to private first class; my confidence also makes me believe I will be commissioning as an officer in the Army by the time I graduate from the University of North Georgia. For these exact reasons I decided to do my senior project on something that would help me accomplish my goals; my senior project was over my experience at the Federal Service Language Academy while learning Mandarin Chinese.

In the last 10 years, the United States has realized that Chinese is the new trend. For many years, the U.S. has not made the teaching of foreign languages a priority in the school systems around the country. For my research paper I decided to focus on the importance of Chinese as a foreign language in the United States. The research paper became my foundation for the reasons why Chinese is one of the best decisions I can make with my life. Challenge Day definitely challenged everything I learned in the three weeks I was in FSLA; my brain was put on the spot and forced to work to its full capacity. Even though Challenge Day was hard, I was able to survive it; I, Yusemi Mondragón, survived a whole day speaking Chinese instead of English or Spanish. I admit, I had never been more proud of myself.

My career choice after the Army will be either intelligence in a federal agency or translator for a business company. My senior project allowed me to open my mind to a new language and culture; if I want to be successful in the FBI or as a translator I need to understand not only the language but the culture as well. The three weeks I spent in FSLA made me realize my love for foreign languages; thanks to FSLA I was able to make up my mind about what I want to do for the rest of my life. Through the research that I conducted for my research paper I began to see that a career in the FBI could be easily acquired if I become fluent or proficient on Mandarin Chinese. The Army will definitely be a big help because it is experience that can open my doors to jobs in the federal agencies.
